From Rev Tom

Last week and next week the New Testament lessons come from Hebrews. They are talking about faith. Faith, we are told, is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen (Heb 11:1). In my sermon last week, I described how faith is component to everything we do in life. Even as I sit into a chair I have faith that it will carry my weight. We don't realise that faith is involved until we have an experience that undermines our faith. This is particularly true in relationships. Have someone tell you a lie and you find out about it and it is very hard to trust that person again. Another aspect of faith for Christians is believing something to be true even as we do not see the reality or outcome. One element of this is in relation to the many seemingly unanswerable questions that are out there in life. We live in a world that is rather intolerant of unanswerable questions. In fact, it is one of the reasons why so many have given up believing in God. A belief in God includes too many unanswerable questions. Who is God? Where is God? How is God present to us? Is God good and if God is good why do bad things happen? Can you prove God exists? At the last Spiritual Direction training weekend, the presenter offered words by Rainer Maria Rilke, from his book "Letters to a Young Poet". In this thoroughly elevating modern classic, Rilke makes a beautiful case for the importance of living the questions, embracing uncertainty, and allowing for intuition. In a 1903 letter to his protégé, the 19-year-old cadet and budding poet Franz Xaver Kappus, Rilke writes:

"I want to beg you, as much as I can, dear sir, to be patient toward all that is unsolved in your heart and to try to love the questions themselves like locked rooms and like books that are written in a very foreign tongue. Do not now seek the answers, which cannot be given you because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps you will then gradually, without noticing it, live along some distant day into the answer."

This is particularly sage advice in a time of uncertainty. When will the pandemic end? Rilke seems to suggest that the real answers that are of the greatest value are found in the struggle we have that invokes the question. What are the questions that arise in you? What do you learn about yourself when sitting with the questions? How do you live into these questions? I tried going through my questions, and found the process quite revealing.

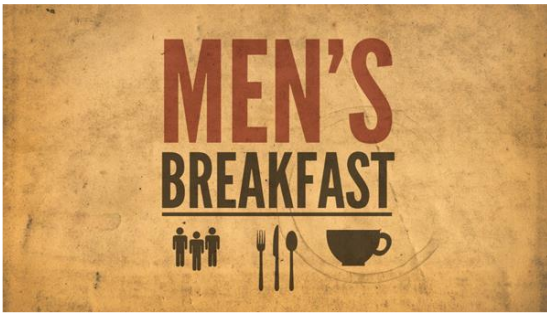
Hunter Community Alliance Contributions for yearly membership fee

A PASSING THOUGHT

Yep, there is yet another section of the Bible that so many Christians avoid; they see it as 'too hard to understand', 'too angry and bloodthirsty', 'oh so downright gloomy' and 'why bother with it anyway, it's just so ancient – not for today!'

Yet, wonder of wonders, our God has placed said section right, bang, in the middle of the Bible with twice as many chapters as the next longest book. He made it contain the longest chapter...and, then for effect, the shortest chapter! He has writers of the New Testament...including Jesus...quoting from it 75 times, with just as many indirect references! So, dear folk, please don't miss the many ways God is shouting to get your attention!!! Oh yes...this most valuable section of God's Word is, of course, The Book of Psalms (more commonly called The Psalter).

Often called "The Psalms of David" (as over half of the Psalms were written by him), though there is a bevy of other authors including Moses, Solomon, Asaph, the sons of Korah...

All, I repeat, **all** of the Psalms are music to God's ears, as it readily shows us how to speak to God in prayer...it doesn't pull any punches...often very raw...if we are being honest with God, isn't this how we should be? A writer of the fourth century, Athanasius, commented that this book of the Bible was unique...the rest of the Bible speaks **to** us, Psalms speaks **for** us! This being the simple reason why so many people in human history have loved to use this most precious of books.

If you are not at all familiar with the Book of Psalms, it is broken into five differing books:

Psalms 1-41 focuses on the character of God in order to teach us how to sing about who God is.

Psalms 42-72 teaches us how to sing when times are hard

Psalms 73-89 models how God wants you to sing out how you feel.

Psalms 90-106 charts the history of God's dealing with the human race so that we can learn to sing about God's plan with the human race.

Psalms 107-150 is a call for you to sing your response to God.



Make no mistake, dear friends, God's desire is for you to be able to develop a deeper relationship with Him. His heart desperately wishes that you can truly sing out to Him in the sort of worship songs/prayers that have always – and ever will be – sweet music to His ears!



By way of closing, two Psalms that have helped pilot my way for Quiet Days and for Retreats have been Psalms 84 and 27 respectively.
