How do I pray without ceasing? I can beat myself up about not spending an hour every day sitting with eyes closed praying for the needs of the world. But this is a very narrow definition of prayer. So what is prayer? Perhaps prayer is also being present in this moment to the person, the place or the circumstances I am in. Perhaps prayer is also the times I think of another person with compassion or concern. Perhaps it's also when I feel angry about the housing crisis in Australia. Perhaps it's when I shed tears about the war in The Ukraine. Perhaps prayer is when I "show up" for another person, or involve myself in a cause to promote the Kingdom of God.

If we live within the one who created the world and everything in it, if who we are, and what we do is held completely within God, then every movement, thought and action is held by God. It is all communication with God, all prayer without ceasing. What's missing is our realisation of this fact.

Maybe the same can be said of faith. We need only to have faith the size of a mustard seed. As Nadia Bolz-Weber says – that's a pretty low bar! When faced with the seemingly impossible task of not causing others to stumble and forgiving every mean thing anyone ever does to them, the disciples ask Jesus for more faith so that they can reach what they see as a very high bar. Jesus basically tells them that they already have enough faith. They don't need their faith to be any greater than a tiny mustard seed, which actually, they already possess. So maybe faith, like prayer, is also expressed in our lives in ways we don't immediately recognise.

If we have children or grandchildren, or teach, or are involved in any situation which adds value to children's lives, that's faith.

If we have love and compassion for other people, and are convinced of the inherent goodness of all people, that's faith.

If we have doubts about our faith and about God, that's faith too, because we are engaged with the questions.

If we are a member of an aging congregation which is letting go of how we've always done things so that a new mission might arise knowing we will never see the results, that's faith.

So we don't need to beat ourselves up or judge ourselves for not reaching the high bar, because there actually is no high bar. We have enough faith, tiny as it might be, no matter what our feelings and thoughts. For we live and move and have our being within the one who is the Creator of all. That is our reality. Our task is to remember it.

Notes from Church Council Chairperson

The Church Council met this week, and began by considering what it means to pray without ceasing, and to have faith as big as a mustard seed. Matters discussed included:

- Several interested people have inspected the Whitebridge property.
- Three members of the congregation attended the Hunter Community Alliance's Community Assembly last week, along with about a dozen people from other Hunter Uniting Church congregations. Stories were shared in small groups and at the front of the room, and we had the opportunity to consider how public action might address the concerns and pressures highlighted in these stories. Four themes arose from the 120+ stories heard in the listening campaign in the last six months.
 - Climate change and its consequences
 - o Homelessness and the lack of affordable housing
 - o Service pressures which are currently insufficient to meet needs
 - Community exclusion, discrimination and marginalisation due to disability, age and mental health concerns.

Each group present was invited to commit to action in one of these areas. We chose climate on behalf of the congregation. One of our number will be involved in the climate action group, and the rest of the congregation are free to support this concern in ways that are appropriate. More information will be available when the action group meets.



- The Church Council no longer requires the congregation to wear face masks when singing.
- There was some discussion about the organisation of pastoral care in the congregation, and recognition of the care that so many members of the congregation provide to each other.
- There will be a brief financial update provided to the congregation after worship on 16 October. The update will be published in Contact the following Sunday.
- The Council affirmed and supported the continuing work of Cathy and the team who run children's activities. There will be a meeting in coming weeks to discuss whether the Grandparents Carers and Kids group, and Holiday Kid's Club will continue next year.
- The Council thanked David Chegwidden and Ken Young for their faithful service to the congregation during their time on the Church Council.
